
Brooklyn Friends School Summer Reading 2017 for Rising 6th Graders

This short story collection tells the stories of the many different people whose lives are touched by a community garden.




Ash by Malinda Lo

fairies and magic).




A Crack in the Sea by H.M. Bouwman

Three sets of siblings are brought together on an adventure of a lifetime by a little magic, helpful sea monsters and a special portal that only opens when least expected.




The Distance Between Us: Young Readers Edition by Reyna Grande

This honest first-person account may be a mirror for many readers, allowing them to see reflections of their own strengths, possibilities, and hopes.




Drowned City: Hurricane Katrina and New Orleans by Don Brown

On August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina's monstrous winds and surging water overwhelmed the protective levees around low-lying New Orleans, Louisiana.





For Trent, middle school feels like a fresh start, a chance to prove to everyone that he's not the horrible screw-up they seem to think he is.




A Mango-shaped Space by Wendy Mass

Mia Winchell has synesthesia, the mingling of perceptions whereby a person can see sounds, smell colors, or taste shapes.




March: Books 1-3 by John Lewis and Andrew Aydin and Nate Powell

Discover the inside story of the Civil Rights Movement through the eyes of one of its most iconic figures, Congressman John Lewis.




One Crazy Summer by Rita Garcia-Williams

Three Brooklyn sisters thought summer in California with their mom would mean Disneyland and Hollywood, instead it's Black Panther camo and cheap Chinese takeout.




A Summer Life by Gary Soto


The Thing About Luck by Cynthia Kadohata
